The tower was guarded by a powerful **garrison** of robots. Octavia had tried for years to reach it, but the defenses continued to **thwart** her efforts. She proposed a plan: **vandalism**. Hedge, one of the adventurers, was tasked with **defacing** the residents' portraits. By **simulating** Hedge's painting path, they planned to cause chaos. Hedge's painting **processor** was very precise.

"Hedge began his work, carefully painting an X on each portrait. The paintings, all squares, were arranged in **concentric** patterns around the town square. Soon, cries of anger echoed through the forest as the residents discovered the damage. The robots, now **agitated**, left their posts to calm the crowd. This created the perfect opportunity for Ethic, Hedge, and Octavia to slip past the defenses. They approached the tower, but a deep ravine stood in their way. They would have to find another way across. The success of their mission depended on their ability to navigate the dangerous terrain and reach the tower before the guards returned. The stakes were high, and time was running out. They pressed forward, determined to succeed."

The solution:

The "X" Painting Puzzle

"Imagine you have a robot named Hedge, and he needs to paint an 'X' on square paintings. But Hedge can only do a few things:

- He can paint one small square (pixel) at a time.
- He can move forward.
- He can turn 90 degrees.



The paintings are like grids, and Hedge needs to paint an 'X' on any size grid. How can Ethic tell Hedge how to do this?"

"One clever way to solve this is to think of the 'X' as a series of squares inside each other, like circles with the same center. These are called 'concentric' squares.

Here's how Hedge can do it:

- 1. **Start:** Begin at a corner and paint that pixel.
- 2. **Move:** Move forward a certain number of spaces, then paint another pixel.
- 3. **Turn:** Turn right and do it again, making a square.
- 4. **Repeat:** Do this until you have painted the outer square.
- 5. **Go Inward:** Move a little bit inward, turn, and repeat the process for the next smaller square inside.
- 6. **Keep Going:** Keep doing this until you reach the center.
- 7. This method is good because it uses the same steps over and over, making it easy for Hedge to understand, no matter how big the painting is."

Keywords

- Sanctuary: A safe and peaceful place. Think of it like a quiet garden where you can relax.
- **Exhibited:** Shown or displayed for everyone to see. Like when your art is shown in a school show.
- **Garrison:** A group of soldiers protecting a place. Imagine toy soldiers guarding a castle.
- **Thwart:** To stop someone from doing something. Like stopping someone from taking your cookie.
- **Vandalism:** Damaging or destroying property on purpose. It's like drawing on walls that you shouldn't.
- **Deface:** To damage the appearance of something. Like putting stickers all over a clean notebook.
- **Simulating:** Making a model of something to see how it works. Like playing with a toy car to see how real cars move.
- **Concentric:** Circles or shapes that have the same center. Like the rings when you drop a pebble in water.
- **Agitated:** Upset or disturbed. Like when you can't find your favorite toy.
- **Processor:** The part of a computer that does the calculations. Like the brain of a computer.



Grammar Review - Brief Summary

Passive Voice

- Remember, the passive voice is used when the action is more important than who did it.
- Example: "The pictures were taken down." (We care about the pictures, not who took them down.)
- We saw mistakes with the verb form: "were took" instead of "were taken."

Future Simple:

- We use "will" or "be going to" to talk about the future.
- Example: "If it rains, we will stay inside."
- We saw mistakes with conditional sentences, and with extra "to"s.

Prepositions:

- These are little words like "in," "on," "at," and "for" that tell us where or when something is.
- Example: "They made a mistake in the plan." (Not "on.")
- We saw errors with incorrect preposition choices.

Collocations:

- These are words that usually go together.
- Example: "Make a decision." (Not "do a decision.")
- We saw errors with using the incorrect verb with a noun.
